Nehemiah 12:31; "Then I brought up the princes of Judah upon the wall, and appointed two great companies of them that give thanks, whereof one went on the right hand upon the wall toward the refuse gate."

As believers we should be giving God thanks everyday for the things going on in our lives, the good and the bad. It's easy to give God thanks when good things happen but how often do we thank Him in the midst of the trials and tribulations? For so long after I suffered the two strokes I was angry with God. How could I possibly thank Him for leaving me in this painful and debilitated state? It took me a long time to let go and stop blaming God, but once I did He began to cultivate a character in me that allows me to "count it all joy" (James 1:2). I'm supposed to be dead right now but our heavenly Father through his Son Jesus Christ made death behave itself in my life. Today, and every day I give God thanks for not only saving my life, but for giving me the Holy Spirit through whom I can now truly live. This does not mean I will not have anymore pain and discomfort, but it does mean I will be able to bear it, and this is a testament to the sufficiency of our Heavenly Father's eternal grace. When our Heavenly Father sees us persevering under our trials, looking to Him to work out His purposes through them, He is there as a loving father should be. The Gap

I've been trying to put this book of Luke 15:1-7 and Luke 18: 9-14 in my own words so I can express the way it makes me feel after I finished reading it. I think that I can say that most of you, if not all of you, can identify with the joy and happiness that comes after you finish reading God's Words and talking about what you just read with somebody. It's like I just read a script about my life in a movie. Just like in Luke 15:1 and 2. There are two different kinds of people. You have the sinners that know they are sinners and those who think they are righteous. Now stop reading this for a moment and just think to yourself and then ask yourself, are you like this? "Yes," most of us are just like the Pharisees who think they're righteous. You might not want to admit it, but you know just like God knows.

Now, let's get back to the point. The Pharisees said to the teacher, man look at this fellow Jesus. He welcomes sinners, but they did not even realize they were just as bad. Their sins were probably not as obvious, at least to them anyway. Now stop again and let this marinate in your mind for a minute. Are you getting my point? If not, then look at it this way. "You can always see somebody else's wrongs, but it's harder to see your own wrongs. Now do you get it?"

Let's get back to business. Jesus sets them out by telling them a parable. In verse 4 of Luke 15 Jesus leaves them (the sheep) in their lost condition "the wilderness" and goes to find the Lost Sheep that not only knows He is a lost sinner, but trusts Jesus to save him. In verse 5 Jesus lays that lost sheep "now saved from the wilderness" on his shoulders and takes it home. Now in verse 7 He tells the Self-Righteous who think they don't need saving that it is the one sheep that admits he is lost that gets saved, not the ninety-nine who don't.

I am just like that Lost Sheep, but I'm trying to get saved. Everytime I get one foot out of the wilderness the Devil pulls me back. It takes humility to repent, to admit that we can't save ourselves is hard on our pride. In Luke 18:9-14 Jesus gives us another chance to compare the two kinds of people. One guy is self-righteous and lifts himself up by comparing himself to the one who knows he is a sinner. That guy can't even look up toward God because he sees how bad a condition he is in. The sin of comparison can be deadly. It is easy to look down at someone that isn't doing as well as you or me and compare ourselves to them in order to lift ourselves up. This happens every day at work, at church, on the street, everywhere. We must only compare ourselves to Jesus and that will always show us just how rotten we are. This then should humble us or bring us to our knees like the man in Luke 18:13 or harden our heart and bring us to hell. Just remember, you can't talk about somebody without talking about yourself.

One Out of Many (a proclamation of strength)

Today's politicians take a problem and do two things with it. First, they try to make people in the public arena afraid of the problem. Then they try to blame the problem on the other side. This is now a regular procedure of both political parties and is the theme of most political campaign advertising. While most people say they are disgusted with negative advertising, the data shows that these ads work. They also bring an increasingly diminished respect and trust for politics and politicians from the public, which is now at its lowest ebb in many years.

The paragraph above is from the book On God's Side by Jim Wallis. Mr. Wallis seems to have his finger on the pulse of society as it stands today. His writings reveals a man passionate and sincere about the Word of God and the commands to love one another. The excerpt is taken from Chapter 8 titled "Conservatives, Liberals, and a Call to Civility." He suggests the need for a deep reflection on the ways we speak to and about one another. He also asks the following: "How do we create the environments that help peace and civility grow or that allow violence and hatred to enter?" As believers, we have an absolute monumental stake in the answer to that question. Mr. Wallis also gave the following analysis: many of us, as Christians, would never have considered violence of the fist but have been guilty of violence in our hearts and with our tongues. We need to be able to relate to others with whom we disagree on important issues without thinking or calling them evil. The words we say fall on the balanced and unbalanced, stable and unstable, the well/grounded and the unhinged alike. The immensity of ground covered in that statement, For "Believers," should be nothing short of spiritually earth-shaking (Matthew 12:38b).

Read 1Timothy2:1-2. So many of our politicians have ridden the wave of popular opinion to their political heights and forgotten God. Godly civility and reasoning (Isaiah1:18)are no longer, or never have been important issues. How soon the lesson of Matthew 4: 8-11 is forgotten by politicians who run for office with so called Christian values. Now the question is: how did we get here and what do we do about it now? Well the basis for that question and the answer to it comes from God a long time ago and is as follows: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from Heaven, and forgive their sin and will heal their land" (2 Chronicles 7:14). How can God be more specific than that?! How can one call themselves by Gods name and be filled to overflowing with so much evil and wickedness. "Out of the same mouth proceeds blessings and cursing. My brethren these things ought not to be," James 3:10. The time for finger pointing and belittling one another has come and gone.

I'm sure you will agree that there is enough blame to go around even in the unified body of Christ, the church. Mr. Wallis related to this issue this way: "I am a Christian, and we must always say that while we Christians are politically diverse, we are united in Christ." Too often the Church has reflected the political divisions of our culture rather than the unity we have in the body of Christ. The Church should be able to offer a message of hope and reconciliation to a nation that is deeply divided by political and cultural differences (John17:22). We can disagree but how we disagree with one another is a question of our witness for Christ.

In closing, read Ephesians 4:32-32 and remember that even though you are incarcerated, what you think ,as a Believer can transfer or influence those you love on the outside. Take no opportunity for granted. Your obligation to the Lords Great Commission demands it. See the world through what Pastor Rick Warren calls "Great Commission Eyes" which is the inside world and the outside world. Send us around the world with the news of your saving power and your eternal plan for all mankind (Psalms 67:2). God Bless.
