Advent: A time to reflect and a time to turn.

As advent comes around each year I am reminded of a seasonal change in Nature. Right now leaves are falling, trees and plants are becoming dormant, some animals go into hibernation (around here, I guess it is mostly snakes and other reptiles); yet, also acorns and other seeds have dropped and Nature is preparing for the future. With the shortened daylight hours and the temperatures becoming colder, I tend to migrate from outdoor activities to more indoor sedentary activities. So when I reflect on that, the realization is that I am part of and partial of the same thing going on around me: God's creation of seasonal change.

It would make sense to me that all things are connected to God and so that holiness is revealed in our ability to make positive connections: the more I can connect, the holier I am. If I believe that God is Love, it is through Jesus and the stories of his way of living and his way of loving. So I wonder if Love is the spiritual DNA that connects everything in the universe and is love what we were made for? Maybe love is what we are that really counts, that really lasts, that really connects.

Can Advent become a time of inward turning, inward reflecting, inward growing close to God and like a seed or acorn open up to fulfill a purpose of growth and new life and connectedness to all of God's creation?

My hope is that this Advent Season, I can connect in better ways to "the mind of Christ" and therefore to all the world and become more the change that is needed and less caught up in my story, my hurts, and my agenda. It takes a lot of confidence in God, especially when I am hurting; I want to make things right and do it now immediately. I can easily obsess and go into my mind about a problem. As a friend once said "life is a river and we are in it, if you don't swim you will drown." I prefer to see a river of God's providential love which is always flowing connecting everything. With God's love and support, I can face the uncertainty, the tension, the inability to be in control. It is in looking towards Jesus' birth, I can prepare to see anew the wonder, love and grace that God makes possible for us all.

Peace! (Isaiah 26:3-4)

Dealing and prevailing during conflict, we sometimes try to do it on our own strength. That is, if we're being honest with ourselves. What we fail to realize is that it doesn't work without God. We must step back and value long term decisions over our immediate decisions no matter how struggling or painful it can be. Our human nature sometimes disallows us that opportunity because of the situation at the time.

Conflicts are part of every person's life and a common problem today is that most people don't know how to deal with conflict nor do they understand the source of real peace. As a result, we've become somewhat ignorant and we see issues around us but we often choose to ignore them. It seems that most people have a common goal of avoiding conflict at all cost. The Greek word, *eirene*, means: to bind together. Peace has the sense of wholeness or inner completeness that brings stability to a person's work regardless of what is happening in his or her life.

We'll find the key to lasting peace in a relationship we build in tranquility with Jesus Christ. If we focus our attention on the Son of God, then he'll give us a perfect peace. That doesn't mean we're immune to sudden shocks or occasional times when we are thrown off balance by circumstances (John 14:27). What does the Lord want? I see and read in Micah 6:8—"But to do justice, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with God." Justice, kindness and humility—that doesn't sound so difficult does it? Try it for a while and tell yourself that you'll respond to each situation from this moment on with a just, kind and humble manner.

The good news: God never intended for you to do all of this by your own strength. From the moment he breathed life into you, he has wanted to give you his spirit and the grace you need. His spirit isn't just a reserve tank that we can switch on when we reach the end of our resources. No, he is meant to be the source of all our efforts at mercy, justice, and love.
