WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY

Kat Spangler, our Associate Minister at UBC and leader of our Prison Ministry Support Group and Editor of "Good News", asked me to write an article about World Communion Sunday for this edition. I'm happy to do that, yet I have to be honest. My original thoughts were two-fold: (1) this is the September issue, and (2) the primary focus group of this newsletter is prisoners. Why write a month ahead of time? And why write to a group who will not be able to participate in any formal way in World Communion Sunday?

First, just a word concerning what World Communion Sunday is about. The first Sunday in October has become for multitudes of churches around the world a time to affirm the unity of the Body of Christ as they gather at the table of the Lord to eat the bread and drink from the cup, representing the body and blood of Christ. Different groups of course have different liturgies that they use for Communion. But all of them partake, remembering the Lord's death until he comes again, just as he commanded. It makes sense to write about it and prepare for it in September so it won't be something for which we are spiritually unprepared.

But what about you who are prisoners, who cannot walk or ride to a nice church house someplace on any Sunday, including World Communion Sunday? Here are some thoughts that might be helpful. You may have other and better ideas and we would love to hear from you if you do. But for starters, think about the following:

1. Remember the original "Lord's Supper" was instituted around a table with Jesus and the apostles. They had just finished their meal, which of course was the important Jewish celebration of Passover. That was on the schedule--that's why they had gathered as far as the apostles knew. After the meal, Jesus took bread, blessed it, broke it, and gave it to them saying, "Take eat, this is my body." And then he took the cup, blessed it, and passed it to them saying, "Drink of it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins." It was profoundly simple!

2. Some of you will eat around tables in the prison dining area on World Communion Sunday, perhaps with some Christian friends--or perhaps not. But you will eat and drink. Some of you are not in the general population and will, as usual, be eating alone. But you are not alone--truly you are not! As you eat and drink, although you do not have the church-blessed or minister-blessed bread and wine, with what you do have to eat and drink, remember the Lord's death until he comes. And remember too that you are a part of a World Wide Communion. You, as believers, are as surely members of the Body of Christ as anybody sitting in the most beautiful cathedral in the world.

I promise you this, brothers and sisters. When I receive the elements and partake of the Lord's Supper at UBC that morning, I will be communing with my Lord who gave his life for me, and I will be remembering and communing with you too! I take the scriptural writer's words with utter seriousness: "Remember those in prison, as though in prison with them; and those who are ill-treated, since you also are in the body" (Hebrews 13:3).

High Road or Low Road

Most of our life we have often heard of "taking the high road" when confronted with some sort of moral question. This should not be confused with "getting on our high horse." Doing that could, in and of itself, be a morality question. Our Lord and savior walked many literal roads when he spent his time amongst us. Of course, the two roads I write of in this piece are not, in the literal sense, roadways we physically walk upon. Instead, I use the term metaphorically. With that in mind, on can assume that "high" would mean the morally correct choice to make and "low" to be the opposite. We could equate high with the Christian path and low with all the rest.

If life's problems were all so clearly defined, then as Christians, our choices would be easy to make. We can only wish that everything was that simple. Talk a look at some of the ten commandments and try to reach a quick and simple decision on what to do in certain situations. Thous shalt not kill (or do murder as some scholars translate it). Sounds really easy, doesn't it? Murder is usually defined as the taking of a life without effect of the law. With that in mind, if you are faced with a situation where taking one or more lives may, not certainly, save other lives where is the "high road" located or what is it? Look no further than the current Israeli—Palestinian conflict boiling as I write this. Both sides claim self-defense. Both sides, in their prevailing religious beliefs, supposedly honor Moses and the commandments given to him by our Lord, no matter what name we call him. It's easy to say we should pray and seek spiritual guidance in all decisions. But when rockets are flying and bombs falling from the sky, reading and praying over the Koran, the Torah, or the Holy Bible doesn't seem like the best option at the moment.

When I was serving in another questionable, from a moral point of view, war in Vietnam, many soldiers bought jackets with the following printed on them: "When I die I know I am going to heaven because I've spent my time in Hell." ... though provoking. Many of those soldiers, including me, thought of our cause as the "high road" and communism as the "low road." We killed others, and were killed in return, all because of some nebulous idea that our views and beliefs were superior to the other side.

To sum it up, as Christians or just plain good citizens of the world, we must be very careful about taking the "high road" in our moral/spiritual view. A literal high road usually has many places where a wrong turn or slippery surface can lead to a long and deadly fall. So do moral high roads.


Isaiah 40:29-31
